





> The Rise of the Urban Fox

Foxes seem to be having it all their own way in Britain at the moment. Not only has hunting them been banned in the countryside, but foxes are even gaining ground in the cities. The urban fox has been slowly growing in numbers for the 5 past fifty years and has now become a regular feature of our cityscape. One playful fox managed to halt a tense football match between Celtic and 20 Rangers by running onto the pitch and slipping past security and police officers, much to the enjoyment of the crowd. To this day, nobody knows quite how he entered or how he escaped. Another was nicknamed 'Herod the Fox' by the exhausted deacons of St Paul's Cathedral as they chased him 25 through the chapels for an entire week.

Despite their little misdemeanours, foxes remain a source of strange fascination for the general public. Most surveys show we have a remarkable degree of affection for these small mammals, despite their rather disagreeable day-to-day 30 behaviour on the street. In one recent online poll, over 80% of the population placed foxes among Britain's most cherished animals. Very few respondents viewed them as

common pests, like rats or mice. So, how is it that these mischievous urban immigrants manage to maintain their positive public image against all the odds?

Some people suggest that foxes have brought a rare glimpse of nature back to our sprawling concrete cities. The sight of a fox could be a brief reminder of the varied British wildlife beyond the city limits. Others believe that our fascination with foxes can be traced back to the fanciful stories we all read 40 as children. Many bedtime classics, like Roald Dahl's 'Fantastic Mr Fox', give the impression that these magical creatures are actually the brave heroes of the animal world, but I suspect the real answer is even simpler. It may be that, amidst the hustle and bustle of our modern cities, these cheeky animals 45 provide a form of relief from the rush of urban life.

It has to be said that as far as animal neighbours go, foxes really are relatively tame. No one has ever complained of being attacked by a fox, whereas thousands of dog attacks are reported to the police every year. Foxes don't tend to 50 spread any diseases, either, apart from the occasional tick which is easily treated. While they may be a nuisance at times, foxes pose no real danger to people.


The village of San Sebastiano al Vesuvio in Italy takes part of its name from the great volcano Vesuvius . There are no fewer than 18 such towns or villages at the base of the volcano with a combined population of almost 600,000 people. The area has a long volcanic history that has had a great influence on the residents of the region. Reports from the last eruption, which was minor, described people putting pots over their heads in order to protect themselves from the rocks 2.

It isn't the safest place to live because the volcano could erupt at any time. In fact, another eruption of this beautiful mountain is long overdue. Astonishingly, despite the risk, many residents claim to enjoy the view 3. They live so close to the volcano that when they look out of their windows, they are unable to see the whole of their giant neighbour but only part of it and the background of the clear blue sky.

Many people who live in the shadow of the volcano have a very laid-back attitude towards life. Residents of the area seem to spend more time with friends than people in other parts of the country, keeping up with gossip or just relaxing over a cup of coffee. Why this is so is hard to guess, but perhaps it is because they know the volcano could destroy their lives at any time. Still, such a light-hearted attitude is not shared by all. The members of the local government are very concerned about the safety of the residents. The last thing they want is a repeat of the tragedy of Pompeii 2000 years ago 4

Experts cannot predict exactly when the volcano will erupt, so plans for an evacuation must always be ready. Currently, it is estimated that it would take approximately two weeks to evacuate the 580,000 people living in the most dangerous areas around the volcano. However, if the population could be reduced to 400,000, it would only take eight to ten days to move everyone to safety.

Even these plans are insufficient. They rely on the assumption that the authorities will have at least eight days to get people away, yet there is no guarantee that they will even have a single



day. When Vesuvius has erupted in the past, the explosions have been very violent and sudden. It is not only the rivers of superheated lava that threaten people. The gases, dust and ash thrown out by the volcano move very quickly 5.

Having so many people living at the base of the volcano, and not knowing how much time they will have to evacuate, has forced the authorities to come up with a different solution. In their latest proposal, residents will be paid to move out of the areas closest to the volcano. The aim is to reduce the population to acceptable levels before Vesuvius erupts again.

The problem is that not many people have applied to take part in the relocation programme. It seems that people have come to trust the volcano 6. This attitude poses one of the greatest threats of all. History tells us that Vesuvius erupts very violently about every 200 years. The last time it did so, in 1631, at least 3,500 people lost their lives. Given the large population living around Vesuvius today, the historic tragedy of Pompeii could be made to look very small indeed.

The use of last names is a relatively new thing and probably came about to distinguish between two people with the same first name. 

Keeping an eye on the kids

Something new is happening in this Cornish town. And as the saying goes, 'new is not necessarily better' - especially if you are a Cornish teenager under 16 years of age. Through the use of a pioneering plan, which to some reeks of prejudice, the local 5 authorities and police officials hope to cut down the number of youths out on the streets at night. It is thought that by doing this, many of the crimes committed by young people will be prevented.

The scheme involves a curfew - a set time when youths must 10 be off the streets and in the warmth and safety of their own homes. For any unsupervised youngsters under sixteen, the bell tolls at nine o'clock sharp. And for all those under ten, the witching hour is spot on eight. The curfew is being enforced by patrols of police officers in the Redruth area. In order to collect 15 any damning evidence that might come to hand, many of the police are equipped with Orwellian-like head cameras. If a hoodie-wearing young delinquent gets the not-so-bright idea of spray painting a wall or overturning a rubbish skip, an officer will more than likely be there filming it. Of course, the film footage will 20 then be used in a court of law as proof of the young hooligan's crime.

If a young person under sixteen is spotted breaking the specified curfew, officials may respond in several ways. Firstly, the parents of the young offender will be contacted and told that 25 they are failing in their duties as responsible parents and that they must ensure that their children abide by the curfew. If that warning fails to bring results, police will call in the social services or housing officials. Either of these two groups may then take formal legal action against the family which could result in parents having to receive counselling or guidance sessions.

In the past, curfews have done what they were supposed to do, which is get the kids off the streets. Dispersal zones were set up under what is known as the Anti-Social Behaviour Act of 2003. This piece of legislation dictates that groups (groups being defined as 'two or more individuals') may be asked to move on if 35 their attitude or mode of behaviour has or may have caused anybody alarm, fear or distress. Human rights activists, however, would like to know just who it is that decides what actually constitutes 'alarm, fear or distress'. After all, people differ, and what may alarm one person may leave another totally unaffected. 40 This could lead to innocent young people out enjoying the long summer evenings being picked on for no good reason.

Not surprisingly, then, it seems that the new programme, aptly code-named Operation Goodnight, has set off a furious debate. Local councillors welcome the scheme, saying that, 45 although the majority of parents in the area behave responsibly, that is not enough. They say that all parents must be persuaded to be more informed about the whereabouts of their children at all times of the day and night. They believe that only in this way will the community be a safer place for everyone.

On the other side of the coin, many locals feel that the teenagers are being robbed of a very important right. Some residents argue that not all teenagers are the same and every effort should be made to remember this fact. They feel that if youths are treated as if each and every one of them is a potential criminal, attitude problems will increase. The Redruth legal officer complains that many of the police treat every young person as a suspect. He says that while the police have every right to get involved if a real problem should arise, they must use better judgement before challenging young people simply 60 because they are out for an evening stroll.

Getting Them Off the Streets

More than 250,000 people under the age of 25 in England and Wales could be classified as homeless. Jamie Adams meets Margaret Kelly, a social worker who is trying to change this statistic.

Last night, Margaret Kelly, after talking to a few of her contacts in the Camden area of London, discovered a 17-year-old girl wandering the streets. She had not eaten for over two days and Margaret took her to one of the nearby shelters. For many of London's homeless, life on the street is the norm. Margaret and her organisation Second Chance work diligently, not only to help homeless people survive street life, but to get them back into society.

Margaret gave me a tour of one of the homeless shelters her organisation works with. This particular shelter provides three meals a day in a dining facility 1. There are beds for up to 200 people available every night of the week and there is a doctor on call four days a week. Telephones have been placed in the entrance hall with a direct line to the police and a helpline. The shelter also has a small library and resource room. Overall, I was impressed with the shelter's cleanliness and friendly atmosphere.

Shelters are a very important source of support for the homeless. However, Margaret explained to me that they provide only temporary relief from the difficulties young homeless people face every day. The real solution lies in getting the youngsters off the street permanently **2**. This is where Second Chance comes in.

When Second Chance work with a homeless teenager, getting a full picture of the teenager's background is their first objective. They need to understand what the young person is going through 3. This information is vital if there is to be any chance of getting a homeless youth off the street. Margaret points out that it may not be as simple as just reuniting the youngsters with their families.

Parents who are no longer willing to accommodate their children are now the biggest single cause

of homelessness. They account for nearly one in four of more than 90,000 new cases reported by local authorities each year, according to Margaret. A return to the family home is not an option for these young people. At Second Chance, they introduce teenagers to jobtraining programmes and classes in independent living. Many homeless teenagers are unaware of how to take proper care of themselves or live an organised life. These classes and self-esteem counselling help teens 4

Most homeless youngsters have quit school, and most will never return. However, as Margaret emphasises, efforts can be made 5. "The sooner a teenager can be brought into contact with mainstream culture, the better the chance of getting him or her off the streets," says Margaret. Only through real contact with everyday people and situations can they be motivated to see more to life. This is what Second Chance pushes for.

Second Chance works with a network of social workers, street contacts, and shelter staff. These groups connect them with the youngsters. After that, it is up to Margaret and her colleagues to get to work and reach out to these youngsters 6.

Statistics show that only one in every eight homeless teens returns to street life after having left it. That seems encouraging but the trick seems to be in getting them off the street in the first place. I asked Margaret what happens when they fail to get a teenager headed in the right direction. "There is always tomorrow and we never stop trying," she replied with a determined smile.



Cuckoos, formally a part of the *Cuculidae* family, include roadrunners, anis and koels. They are generally a medium sized bird and, contrary to popular belief, they do not all lay their eggs in the nests of other birds but actually build their own. The cuckoos that do find temporary shelter for their eggs in the nests of other species are known as brood parasites. Only three of the species known to live in the New World adopt this practice.

I can honestly say that staying in a rented cottage on the banks of a river in the Cotswalds had come as a very pleasant surprise. The ad had said that the cottage would be the perfect accommodation for a small family or two couples. The two bedrooms, living area and kitchen were more than adequate for my husband, son and me. With its fully-equipped kitchen, modern air conditioner, hot and cold running water, and well-stocked linen cupboard, we couldn't have asked for anything more in a holiday house.

The business of finding accommodation for the upcoming academic year is always difficult for university students. Many UK universities have halls of residence for first-year students but places are limited — it's a question of 'first come, first served'. Modern technology makes looking for a suitable place to live far easier. You simply ask for help on the Internet through a site which asks you to type in what you want and how much you want to pay. Within seconds it gives you a list of possibilities. It makes life simpler and you don't have to tire yourself out going to endless accommodation agencies or making loads of phone calls — and this means you can concentrate on your studies.





She had come back full of tales about her adventures and the wonderful people of the country. Nellie said that her friend had gone on in detail about how the experience had changed her life, her attitudes and her plans for the future. It all sounded incredibly exotic and eye-opening to me, and I wanted to be a part of it.

Six months later, I was. Going through a company called Filling the Gap, which I had found out about while surfing the Net, I was offered a teaching position in an orphanage in Ghana. My parents thought it was a terrible plan, but with the backing of my two siblings, Jane and Ron, they finally came round to the idea of me going off to the vast continent of Africa. To be perfectly honest, on arriving in Ghana I had a few fleeting moments when I thought perhaps my parents had been right and that I was making the mistake of a lifetime.

The orphanage where I was to spend the next eight months living and working was run-down and very poorly



managed. Only four of the classes which were supposed to be taught at the school had teachers, and of these four teachers only one of them ever showed their face in the classroom. The other three spent most of their working day sitting under a huge tree in the orphanage vard eating 45 nuts and trading gossip. It seemed that there was nobody at the orphanage who could tell me what I was supposed to teach, who I was supposed to teach or with what materials I was supposed to teach. I knew I had my work cut out for me

After several days, the manager of the orphanage showed up and assigned me a classroom and handed me a list with twelve names on it; these names belonged to the children to whom I was expected to offer all my wisdom. Initially, I was simply confused. However, after a few days 55 of getting names wrong, to the utter delight of the children, I settled in and things started to go the way they were meant to. The children were tremendously eager to learn and to see the look of pure joy on their faces as they began to understand a particular subject came to mean 60 the world to me.

Seeing the class as a whole develop, and individual students bloom, over the next few months was extraordinarily rewarding. My whole gap year experience was nothing but positive. Never did I receive anything 65 except warmth, gratitude and acceptance from these wonderful people. Being housed with the same children I was teaching meant that we had plenty of time for extracurricular activities that the children could simply not get enough of. Their thirst for knowledge was humbling. Going 70 to Ghana changed my entire perspective. It cleared up all the questions I had had about my future. The only question now remaining is how soon I can get back to Ghana, and back to the amazing children I left behind in the orphanage.



The Thieving SEA

Most people would consider it paradise: a remote South Seas chain of islands way off the beaten track. It has palm trees and golden beaches and clear blue sea for the less than 1,000 visitors it receives every year. The 11,800 inhabitants are a warm and welcoming people . But there is a problem. Little by little, day by day, the sea is stealing the land and the island chain is shrinking.

Tuvalu is a series of islands in the Pacific Ocean that are no more than four metres above sea level at their highest point. As temperatures rise due to global warming, the polar ice caps will slowly melt **2**. If these calculations are correct, then within half a century, the greater part of Tuvalu will find itself underwater.

Already the locals are facing problems that seriously affect the way of life on the islands. With Tuvalu measuring just 25 square km across all the islands, most properties are near the coast 3. When the waves come ashore, the water can now reach people's doorsteps quite easily. The islands have had floods before, but they've never reached this far inland and never this frequently.

This doesn't only mean that islanders will have to move further inland. Tuvalu's economy is based to a large extent on farming and fishing; the high tides are saltwater and that gets into the soil that is used to grow food. This results in rotten crops 4. Added to that is the problem of where the locals' animals graze now that the soil is unusable.

This is not just something that affects a small island nation thousands of miles away; unfortunately it is happening all over the world. If you live on the coast, the coast is getting nearer. Take the east coast of England, for example. House prices there have dropped considerably as the sea has flooded low-lying areas. Residents are finding it more and more difficult to sell their properties **5**. There is a real threat that not only homes, but whole villages will no longer be there in fifty years.

Those with property at risk are asking what the government intends to do to protect its citizens. Unfortunately, beyond the usual statements about cutting emissions in a bid to reduce global warming, the government just doesn't have the funds to stop the sea's slow assault. Unofficially, there has even been talk of remapping the country's coastline to take account of the changes. It seems there is little for residents to do, but move to higher land, further away from the coast.

The cold reality of climate change refugees grows ever closer. For those in England, the move could be merely local **6** . However, for the Tuvalu islanders, it could mean an entirely new life in a different location. Many are already considering a move to nearby New Zealand. We don't really know what the future holds for them, but one thing is certain, and that is the fact that climate change is having real effects on real people and it is happening now.

The first European explorers to arrive on the desolate, treeless island in the middle of the Pacific Ocean were amazed to find several thousand healthy inhabitants living there quite happily. Although there is no doubt that Easter Island had once been a lush tropical island, its transformation to a barren, windswept landscape is something that has baffled scientists for nearly 300 years.

Until recently, the most popular theory has been that the island once had a very large population which systematically destroyed the island's natural resources through sheer ignorance. Many environmentalists are convinced over-exploitation of the environment led to famine, war and the collapse of society. They also believed that parallels can be drawn between the fate of Easter Island and what is now happening to the environment in the modern world. In other words, what occurred on Easter Island is a warning of what is likely to become of our society, too.

There is, however, a growing number of scientists 2. For one thing, there is little archaeological evidence to suggest that there have ever been huge numbers of inhabitants on the island. Neither is there any indication of full-scale warfare or ecological catastrophe. What is known, though, is that the first Europeans did not find a society wrecked by disaster, but a population managing very successfully on limited resources.

It is not the deforestation of the island that is disputed so much as how it actually occurred. It has been widely accepted that it was purely the result of human intervention. To support this is a theory on how the hundreds of strange statues, known as Moai, came to be dotted around the island's coast. It is argued that the islanders would have had to cut down enormous numbers of trees to


use as rollers to move the huge sculptures from the stone quarry 3.

New research has shown, however, that they could have been moved without requiring either large numbers of people

or a lot of timber. Instead, small teams of islanders, using a few wooden levers, could have 'walked' the statues. This would have involved moving them from side to side in much the same way as a fridge is usually moved.

Another possibility put forward for the cause of the deforestation is that it was not the islanders themselves, 4. The evidence is to be found in the huge numbers of ancient rat bones discovered on the island. It has been shown on other Pacific islands that these animals can trigger deforestation by eating the seeds of trees, 5. According to some scientists, this is what brought about Easter Island's dramatic change of landscape.

Another point worth considering is that the worst ecological disaster to take place on Easter Island may not have been the loss of woodland. It is, in fact, more likely to have been the arrival of Europeans. Within only 150 years of their arrival the island's population had fallen to less than 100 people. The resilient islanders had managed to adapt to the various ecological problems their environment had thrown at them, 6. 
